Cliff's Notes

Many people find comfort in pop culture. It's relaxing and entertaining to watch the latest episode of that favorite sitcom, the most current crime procedural ripped from the headlines, or the most recent "Real Housewives of Someplace You've Never Been". Well, this play is definitely not likely to be grouped in with these examples.

Our season this year has included stories of outcasts: two young kids who don't share their families' hatred - yet ultimately still succumb to that hatred's power; and a group of adolescents (and 3 adults) at a spelling bee who are united by the eccentricities that separate them from the rest of society. "Tartuffe" does not necessarily involve outcast characters - but the play itself is an outcast because so few people have heard of it; the fact that it's written in rhyming verse seems unnatural; and, let's face it, modern audiences love sight gags and spectacle, not witty repartees.

But what I love about Tartuffe is that it has endured. Like so many other classics, it transcends time because it continues to be relevant centuries after it was written. The structure of the plot is close to perfect and the satirical comedy rings true even though it first appears we have little in common with the 17th century French bourgeoisie. Amazingly, we find that we relate all-too-well to the characters and their plight. 350 years from now, will the same be true for those housewives or for that crazy doctor's yet-again-spot-on diagnosis? I guess time will tell. But whether they make it or not, I'm willing to bet there will be a production of "Tartuffe" happening down the street.

Thanks for supporting the arts and what they teach to our students. I hope you enjoy the play as much as we've enjoyed making it happen. Merci!

I find it strange to be sitting on the sidelines this time around. I knew my position in the show beforehand, yet it was somewhat bizarre not seeing my name on the cast list when it was first posted. I am not a leader, though some may beg to differ. I'm terrified of being judged and, more often than not, leaders are judged. I'm guilty of judging past stage managers myself, so it seemed inevitable. Whether I corrected lines or not correcting lines, I would still get incredulous looks from cast members thinking they're in the right and I'm in the wrong. That just comes with the territory though. Being stage manager is a thankless job, there's no denying that. Sassy actors will be ever present, and there's not much you can do but move on. Though it seems like I might regard my time as stage manager with disdain, really, this is not the case at all. Every minute of watching these actors develop their characters, and even themselves, has been a joy. When things do go right, I feel a sense of pride. This show is wonderful and I have no regrets about taking a seat offstage. J.K. Rowling's Albus Dumbledore could not have put it any better. "It is a curious thing, but perhaps those who are best suited to power are those who have never sought it. Those who have leadership thrust upon them, and take up the mantle because they must, and find to their own surprise that they wear it well."

Assistant Director's Notes

"Are you ever going to repeat a show?" People often ask "When are you going to do WOZ again?" or "You should do Hello, Dolly! Again!" With the exception of Endangered, our HIV/AIDS awareness play, Theatre33 has never repeated a production.

Our goal, or my goal, is to never repeat one. I have repeated shows at other schools and community theatres. For example, I have helped direct Charlie Brown three times. It is tough to repeat a show, and I have several reasons why I never want to here. First of all, we have a list of dream shows to do that could last us another 20 years, and second of all, I want to hang on to the memories of past shows.

As with Endangered, the previous actors and their voices and actions are stuck in my head. It's hard to repeat a show without constantly remembering how Rueben did it – or how Marie said it – This is one reason why we/I have decided to retire Endangered. The last cast, including Carlos Ibarra, Matthew Grawcock, Tania DeLuna, Carli Mast, Rachael Stump, Amanda Musser, and Brandon Replogle, will always have a very special place in my heart. We accomplished a long time goal of taking a show on the road when in December 2009 we performed at the Anthis Career Center for World AIDS day. I know I could never repeat this show.

As for Tartuffe, back in 1994 at Valparaiso University I was SM/AD. Working with this show, it has been fun to remember, but difficult to let each actor do it their own way.

Remembering college friends - Leah as Elmire, Tim as Valère, Hal as Damis, Rhett as Tartuffe, Patty as Mariane, and Crazy Laura as Mme Pernelle - has been fun, but it is important to let each actor bring to the role their own interpretations and decisions, their own inspirations and choices. Just because something worked before doesn't mean it will again.

At first, I really struggled not seeing these old faces (now all over 40!) on our stage, but now, I'm proud to say our T33 actors have done a great job of making these characters their own and have made our production of Tartuffe unique and not just a replica of other past productions.

Memories of past productions are dear to me. Memories of moments at rehearsals and work sessions and working with actors and techies over the years will always be treasured. This is a special cast, a show that has been on the dream list for a long time with a special group of seniors – many of which we have had on stage as wee little munchkins or flying monkeys, or king's children or attendees at SCENE camp. We have known these seniors for a long time and we have watched them grow up into some pretty amazing people. We have been through some of our lowest lows together – losing Brandon and Amanda – and some of our highest highs – Seussical, R&J, Arsenic, Spelling Bee. This is a group of memories that could never be duplicated, and will always be treasured.

History of Tartuffe

In *Tartuffe*, a comedy in five acts, <u>Molière</u> relates the story of an attempt, by an irreclaimable hypocrite, to destroy the domestic happiness of a citizen who, charmed by his seeming piety, has received him as a prominent guest. In painting such a portrait, this lively assailant of Parisian foibles was in a new element, though one that proved to him perfectly congenial. His genius had a serious side, and on that side he was unquestionably at his best, the character of Tartuffe being drawn with a strength and precision which few dramatists have equalled.

The first three acts were produced during the fêtes held at Versailles, nominally in honor of the queen and Anne of Austria, but really to please the maid of honor who had now become the king's mistress. It would be impossible to exaggerate the effect produced by this gruesome picture upon its first beholders--upon the mass of revelers who, resplendent in masquerade attire, filled the theatre in every part.

The king at once perceived the genius displayed in *Tartuffe*, and was also clear-headed enough to see that it was aimed exclusively against hypocrisy; but from the moment it made its appearance in Paris another and heavier storm began to rage over the head of the dramatist. According to his assailants, he had at length thrown aside the mask altogether, and under pretense of exposing hypocrisy was seeking to undermine the foundations of religion itself.

Irritated by his disappointment, Molière registered a vow that, sooner or later, the interdiction should be set aside, and before long awakened such a friendly interest in his drama among the leaders of society as to induce the king to withdraw his prohibition. This was made the more easy by the anxiety of the fashionable world to taste the forbidden fruit, the salons competing with each other in their inducements to have *Tartuffe* read in the presence of a select audience; for "no greater pleasure," they said, "could be afforded them." Molière complied with many of these requests, inasmuch as they gave him an opportunity of dispelling the numberless misapprehensions in regard to his play, and of inspiring a wish to see it performed on the stage. His first private reading was before the pope's legate and a party of prelates, who, imagining *Tartuffe* to be a covert satire against the Jansenists--an idea which, however erroneous, the author took no pains to dispel--decided very strongly in its favor. The Jansenists placed on it an entirely different construction, while Molière, adroitly answering the questions put to him, managed to win over both sides, and that without suffering any twinges of conscience.

Tartuffe debuted as a three-act play in 1664 before King Louis XIV at the Palace of Versailles. Although Louis liked the play, court clergymen condemned it because they believed it unfairly lampooned religion and its practitioners. the king banned public performances of it. After Molière revised it twice, enlarging it to five acts and recasting Tartuffe as a layman, Louis approved it for its first public performance, which took place on February 5, 1669. It went on to enjoy a reputation as one of the finest stage comedies in French literature.
